What outcomes is the policy/decision hoping to achieve

The Cabinet Member for Highways Maintenance and Sustainable Transport agrees with officer recommendations to implement the 20mph speed limit.

The changes to speed limits in Saffron Walden Town Centre were developed to make walking and cycling more attractive for residents, encouraging a shift away from short car journeys. This will help to create a better environment and encourage visitors and residents to the Town centre creating custom for local businesses to help boost the economy.

This scheme is being funded by the Uttlesford Local Highway Panel (LHP). The views of local Residents are represented on the LHP by local Councillors. The Councillors not only represent the views of local Residents but also Parish/Town Councils and other bodies, such as Housing Associations.

The proposed speed limit was formally advertised in the local newspaper, The Saffron Walden Reporter. All members of the public were able to comment on the scheme when it was formally advertised. A letter drop encompassing the affected area (approximately 1394 properties) was sent out to residents and local businesses inviting them for their comments, explaining the proposed changes and included a copy of the plan. As a result, 12 objections were received however most comments were those in support of the scheme.

As a result, a Cabinet Member Action report has been written, including the option to abandon the scheme. These comments are being considered in the report and the Cabinet Member is being asked to make a decision in light of these.
